

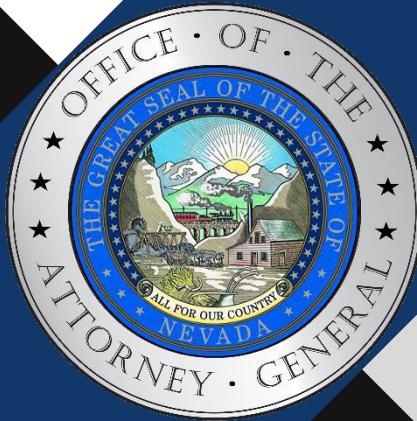

## MESSAGE FROM NEVADA ATTORNEY GENERAL AARON D. FORD

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*One of my goals when I was first elected to serve as your Attorney General was to improve community trust in our justice system. Building greater trust in law enforcement is particularly important to me. The 2020 murder of George Floyd in Minnesota brought international attention to the issue of law enforcement’s use of force. The issue was no less important to Nevadans. I held a series of town hall meetings, bringing together various law enforcement officials and community members to discuss use of force. During the 81<sup>st</sup> Legislative Session (2021), the Nevada Legislature updated use of force reporting requirements through Senate Bill 212 (“SB212”), which was passed and is now codified in NRS 193.309. This use of force data is collected by the State of Nevada Department of Public Safety’s Central Repository for Nevada Records of Criminal History (“Central Repository”). As part of the new mandates of SB212, my office became responsible for preparing an annual report “containing any conclusions or recommendations resulting from our review” of publicly available data.*

*Although both Nevada and federal laws have for years required certain law enforcement agencies to submit information on a multitude of crime statistics, Nevada had to undergo a multi-year program update not only to comply better with federal requirements, but also to make the data accessible to the public. My office has been working with the Central Repository since 2022 to help them obtain the funding necessary to update the existing reporting system that makes it possible to sort and display crime statistics in a user-friendly manner. There is still work to do to train and assist law enforcement agencies in utilizing the updated program. The Central Repository went live with the use of force data in April of this year, and I am able to bring to you the first annual report on statewide use of force data pursuant to NRS 193.309. The numbers upon which this report is based, as well as other Nevada crime statistics, are available at <https://nevadacrimestats.nv.gov/tops>. I encourage you to visit the site and review the information for yourself.*

## I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is the Office of the Attorney General’s (OAG) first report pursuant to Nevada Revised Statute (NRS) 193.309. The scope of this report is limited to April 2023 through November 2023 and does not include all agencies required to report under NRS 193.309. These constraints are described in further detail under the section of this report entitled “Scope and Data Limitations.” To summarize briefly here, the State of Nevada Department of Public Safety’s Central Repository for Nevada Records of Criminal History (“Central Repository”) has been engaged in a multi-year effort to update its data collection and reporting system to include training and outreach to law enforcement agencies across the state, assisting them in their efforts to comply with NRS 193.309. The Central Repository went live with the use of force website module in April 2023 and agencies were not required to begin reporting into the upgraded system until then. Notwithstanding data limitations, fifty-four (54) law enforcement agencies submitted use of force statistics to the Central Repository.<sup>1</sup> Use of force data is available to the public on the Central Repository website at <https://nevadacrimestats.nv.gov/tops>.

### A. *Not All Use of Force Public Complaints Are “Reportable” under FBI Requirements*

Combined, all agencies logged 194 use of force complaints against peace officers. These are complaints from the public made directly to each agency. Law enforcement agencies substantiated 46 of those complaints. FBI reportable use of force is specific to incidents when a fatality occurs, when there is serious bodily injury to a person<sup>2</sup> or when a firearm is discharged by a law enforcement officer at or in the direction of a person. From the information reported, the OAG is unable to ascertain whether the 46 substantiated complaints equate to the FBI’s definition of reportable use of force. Instead, this number represents the sum of public complaints and whether those complaints were substantiated as a violation of the policies and procedures of the law enforcement agency reporting the number.

### C. *The Central Repository Calculated a Total of Twenty-Three Reportable Use of Force Incidents*

Focusing on reportable use of force incidents statewide, there were a total of 23 events between April 2023 and November 2023. Based on the data collected, most law enforcement agencies in Nevada neither received public complaints nor experienced use of force incidents. Of the 54 agencies reporting to the Central Repository, eight (8) indicated one or more reportable

use of force incidents. The eight (8) law enforcement agencies that logged reportable use of force events are as follows:

**D. Other Notable Observations**

In addition to subject and officer injuries, the Central Repository collects a myriad of other information relating to the reportable use of force incidents, including demographic information and the circumstances surrounding the event. Appendix 1 of this report includes the National Use of force Data Collection Preparation Worksheet used in the reporting process. Of the 23 reportable incidents, 9 involved the death of a person due to law enforcement use of force and 15 involved one or more serious injuries of a person resulting from law enforcement use of force. All reportable use of force incidents registered with the Central Repository resulted in either death or serious injury. The total number of injuries reported exceeds the number of incidents because one or more subjects may have suffered multiple types of injuries.

Each agency is also required to report whether officers were injured during these events. The officer injury statistic noted in this report should not be confused with the number of officers injured or killed in the line of duty, which does not necessarily coincide with a use of force incident. Moreover, the number of officers exceeds the number of incidents because some incidents included multiple officers at the scene. Of the more than 50 officers involved during this time period, one (1) officer sustained a non-fatal gunshot wound, one (1) suffered serious injuries requiring medical intervention or hospitalization and one (1) had minor injuries. No peace officers were killed during reportable use of force incidents.

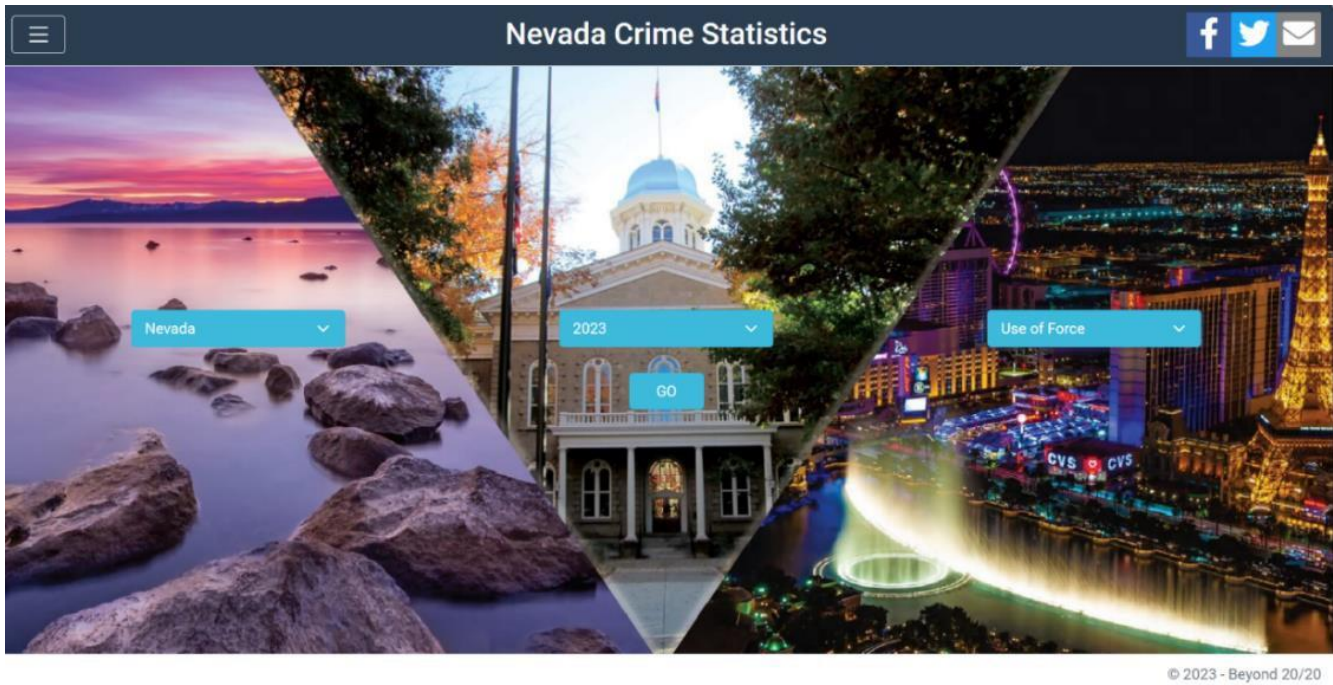
Public complaints and reportable use of force incidents were more frequent in populous jurisdictions. Nevada Highway Patrol - Northeastern Command substantiated one (1) public complaint in 2023. No other substantiated complaints were reported in rural areas. Of the agencies recording reportable use of force incidents during this time period in 2023, only one (1) occurred in a rural jurisdiction (Storey County).

A large portion of use of force incidents occur at night and in the twilight hours. Nearly 43% of reportable use of force incidents occurred between 9:00 pm and 3:00 am. Use of force incidents mostly involve males. Nearly 82% of the subjects were male and over 86% of involved peace officers were male.

## II. RECOMMENDATIONS

- ❖ For the Central Repository to continue assisting law enforcement agencies to comply with new reporting requirements under NRS 193.309 and submit prior year data.
- ❖ For the Central Repository to conduct education and outreach to law enforcement agencies across the state to ensure accurate reporting.

### **III. BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The Nevada Legislature passed Senate Bill 212 (“SB212”) during the 81st Legislative Session (2021), which is codified in Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 193.309. This law requires certain law enforcement entities to submit monthly use of force data to the Central Repository and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Specifically, NRS 193.309.1 (a)-(b) requires agencies to report the following:

*(a) The number of complaints against peace officers employed by the law enforcement agency relating to the use of force and the number of such complaints that were substantiated; and*

*(b) A compilation of statistics relating to incidents involving the use of force that, for each incident, includes, without limitation, all information collected by the National Use of Force Data Collection of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.*

SB212 expanded the category of agencies required to submit monthly data to the Central Repository by adding Nevada Department of Corrections (NDOC) as a mandatory reporting agency, which was not previously required to report use of force data to the FBI. The law also provides for the information to be publicly available. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) then reviews the use of force data published on the Central Repository’s public crime statistics website and submits a report containing any conclusions or recommendations resulting from its review to the Governor and the Legislature.

### **IV. CENTRAL REPOSITORY DATA COLLECTION PROGRAM UPDATES**

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The Central Repository has been engaged in a multi-year effort to update its data collection and reporting system to comply with state and federal mandates. In response to the Central Repository’s contracted vendor estimates to update the data collection and reporting system, the OAG provided approximately \$85,250 in settlement funding to the Central Repository in 2022 with legislative approval. This enabled the Central Repository to implement the system updates needed to effectuate the use of force reporting program pursuant NRS 193.309. The website containing use of force information went live in April 2023.

Prior to SB212, the Repository did not collect use of force data, however local law enforcement agencies had the ability to provide the data to the FBI. The FBI began collecting use of force data from law enforcement agencies across the country in 2019. The most recent data is available on their website at <https://www.fbi.gov/cde>. The data collection includes statistics on use of force incidents throughout the United States and some basic information on the circumstances, subjects, and officers involved. FBI reportable use of force is defined as:

- ❖ When a fatality occurs to a person in connection to use of force by a law enforcement officer.
- ❖ When there is serious bodily injury to a person in connection with use of force by a law enforcement officer.<sup>3</sup>
- ❖ In the absence of either death or serious bodily injury, when a firearm is discharged by a law enforcement officer at or in the direction of a person.

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According to NRS 193.309, the following categories of law enforcement entities are required to report: sheriff's offices; metropolitan police departments; police departments of incorporated cities; the Nevada Department of Corrections (NDOC)<sup>4</sup>, police department for the Nevada System of Higher Education; any political subdivision of this State employing park rangers to enforce laws within its jurisdiction; and any political subdivisions of this State which has as its primary duty the enforcement of law and which employs peace officers to fulfill its duty. Each of these entities submit monthly reports to the Central Repository, and if there are no reportable use of force incidents in a given month, they must file what is called a "Zero Report."

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## **V. NATIONAL USE OF FORCE DATA COLLECTION**

## **VI. TYPES OF LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES REQUIRED TO REPORT**

This document is an account of the number of reportable use of force events throughout Nevada, and does not include an analysis of whether the use of force by these agencies was justified. NRS 193.309 does not require the OAG to conduct such an evaluation for this report. Here, the OAG does not address issues relating to excessive use of force or any other conduct that deprives persons of rights protected by the Constitution or laws of Nevada and the United States. Additionally, this information was not publicly available until April 2023 because of the time it took to obtain funding and implement the program updates, including training law enforcement agencies on how to use it. Therefore, this report neither captures a full year of data, nor a comparison to prior years of data.

Available data on the Central Repository Crime Statistics website is extensive. The site gives the user the ability to run reports, controlling for factors, including but not limited to: geography; jurisdiction; type of agency; race/ethnicity; age; gender; and type of injury sustained by both subjects and peace officers. The OAG did not compare any of the Central Repository’s data against census data.

This report is a snapshot of information provided to the Central Repository during the narrow period of April 2023 to November 2023, and is subject to change as agencies continue to input data. Because this report does not include all mandated reporting entities, a full year’s worth of numbers, nor prior year information, the OAG does not submit any conclusions, extrapolations, or inferences regarding the substance of this data. There is also some agency information that was not automatically populating on the public-facing website at the time this report was generated. The data, while not complete, is sufficient to make limited observations about use of force complaints and reportable incidents.

## **VII. SCOPE AND DATA LIMITATIONS**

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<sup>3</sup> The definition of serious bodily injury is based on 18 U.S. Code § 2246 (4) as “bodily injury that involves a substantial risk of death, unconsciousness, protracted and obvious disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of a bodily member, organ, or mental faculty.”

<sup>4</sup> Through SB212, the Nevada Legislature expanded use of force reporting beyond that of the FBI to include NDOC. The FBI has not historically collected use of force information from correctional institutions. DPS is working with NDOC to assist them with their reporting for submittal of the relevant and appropriate information into the public database. NDOC informed the OAG it is wholly supportive of these reporting requirements and will provide all information as soon as they have been provided an account that will permit such information to be reported.

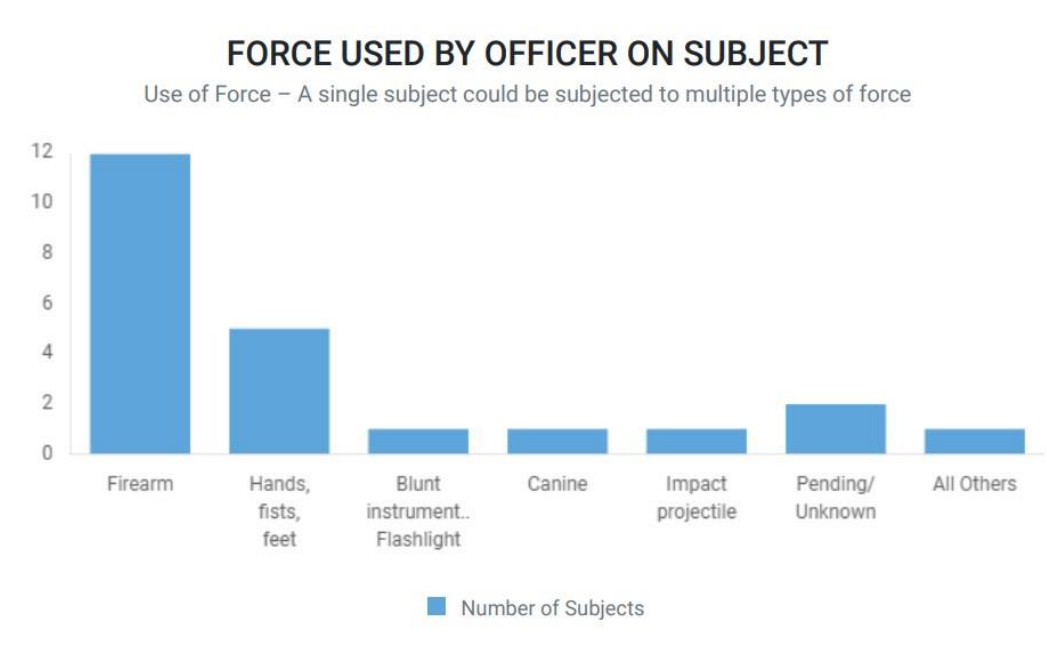
### A. 2023 USE OF FORCE COMPLAINTS

This data is insufficient to determine whether substantiated public complaints coincide with reportable use of force complaints. Each agency determines what constitutes a “substantiated” report. Absent an investigation or legal action, agencies are not required to specify details of public complaints when the nature of the complaint and circumstances do not comport with FBI “reportable” criteria.

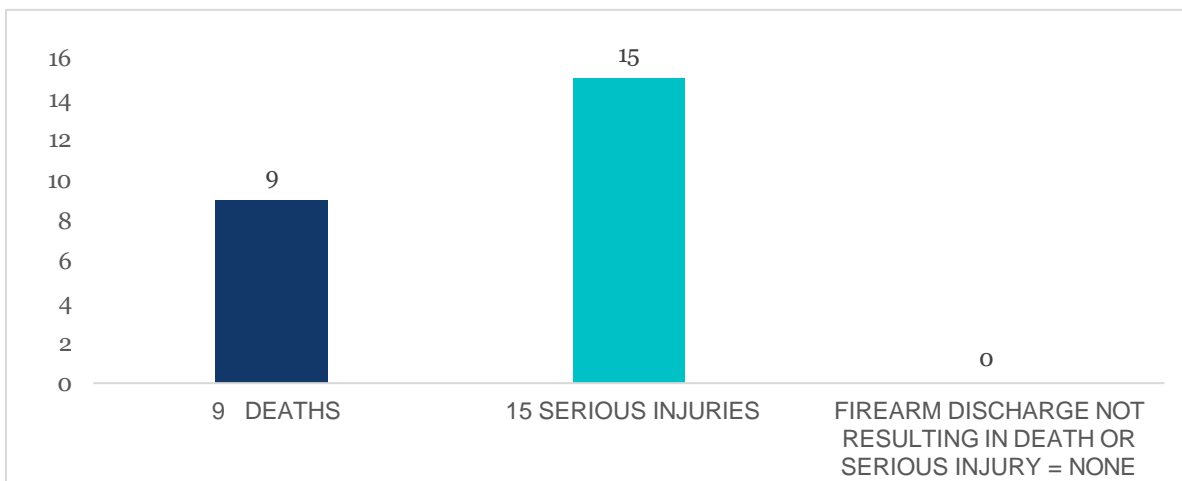

## B 2023 REPORTABLE USE OF FORCE BY LAW ENFORCEMENT



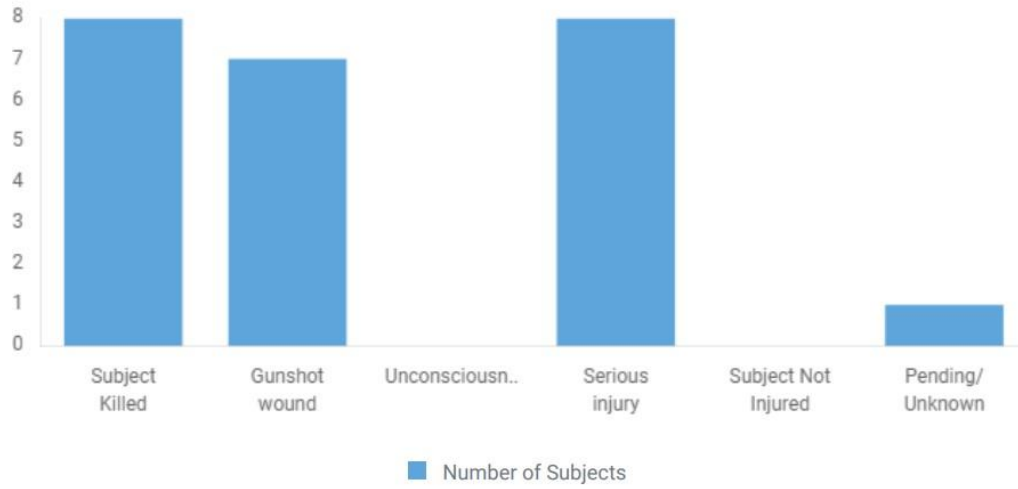
### NUMBER OF INCIDENTS IN EACH CATEGORY OF REPORTABLE FORCE



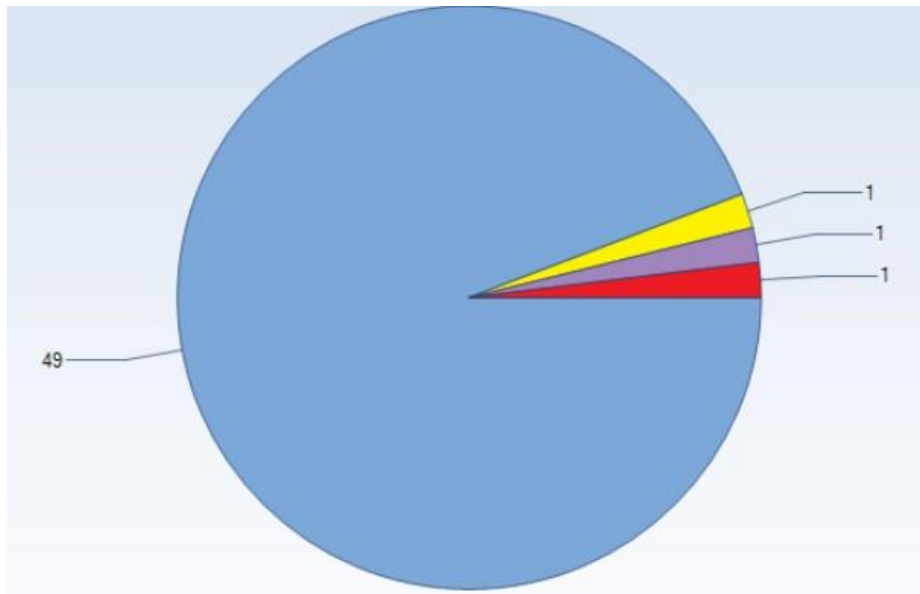

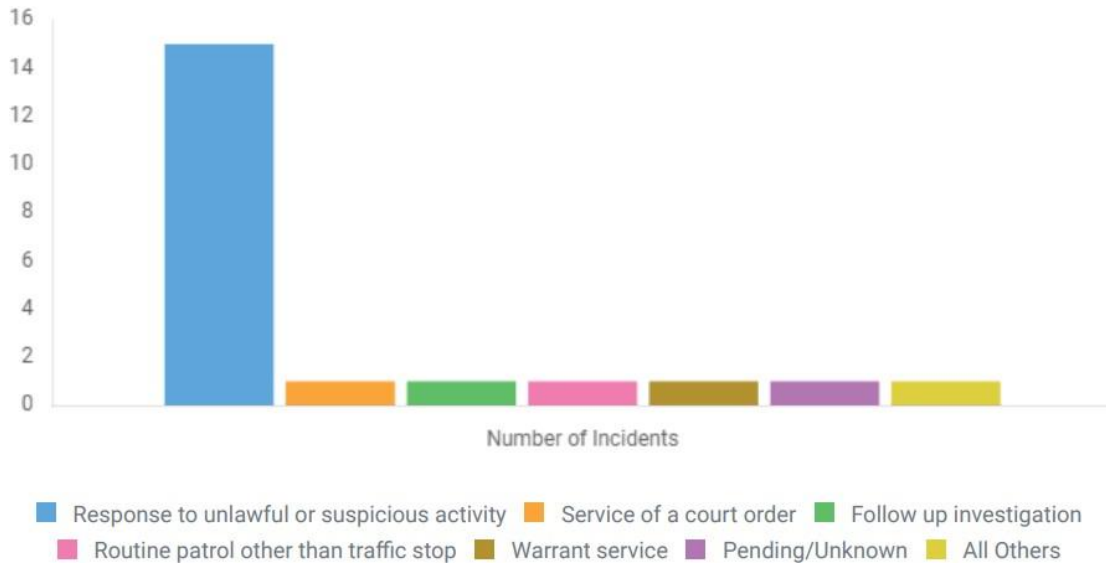

## LOCATION AND CIRCUMSTANCES OF INCIDENTS

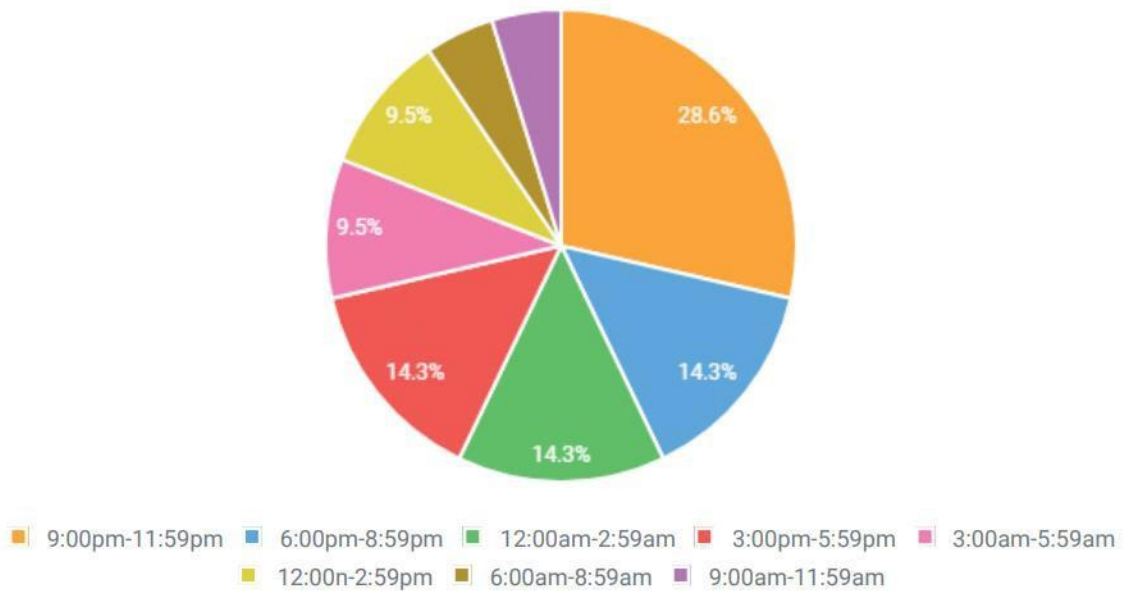
### INITIAL CONTACT

Use of Force



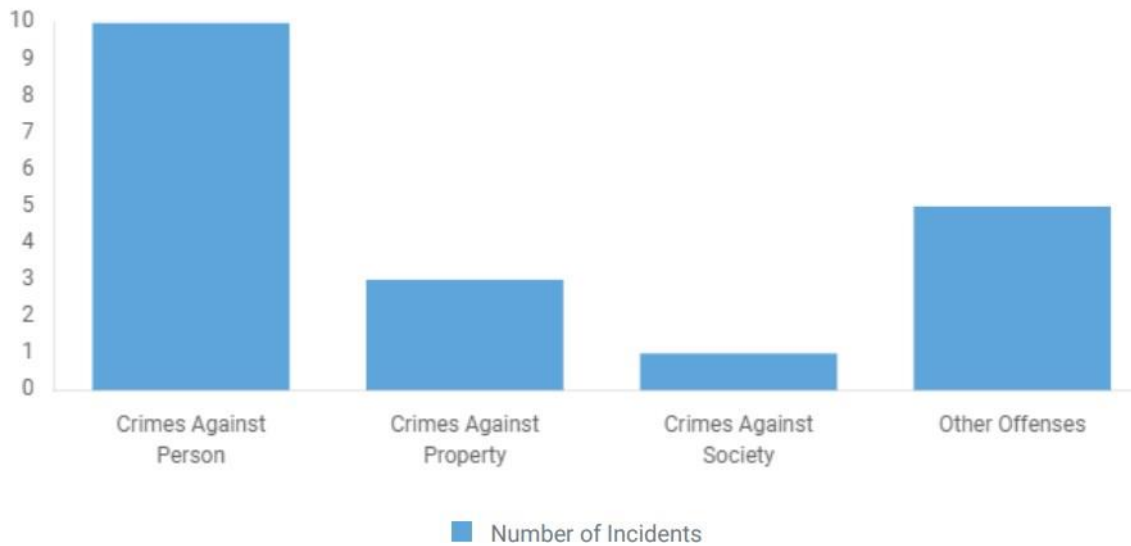
### TIME OF DAY

Use of Force



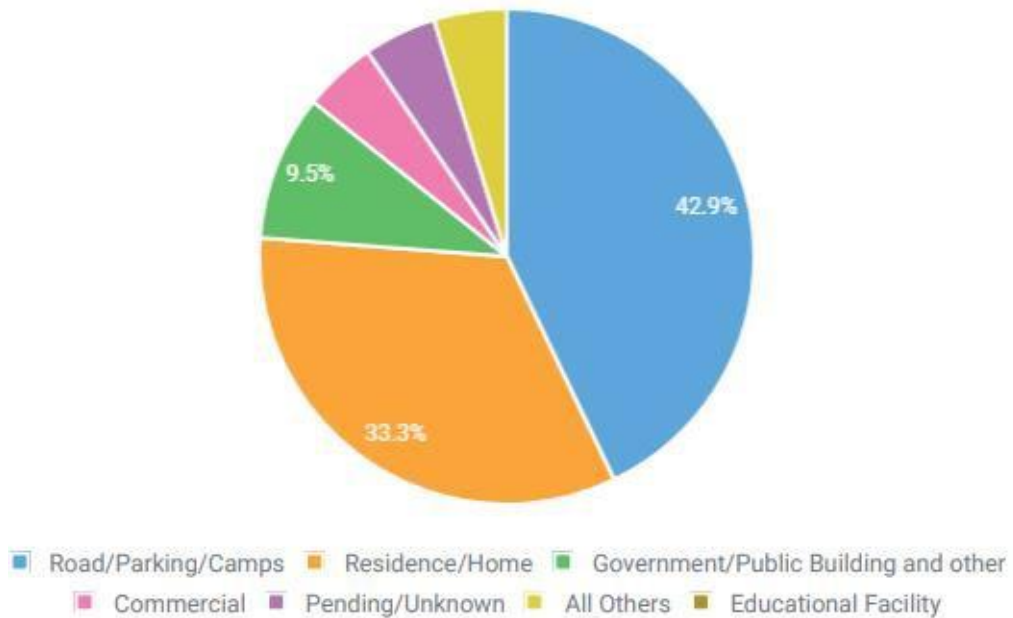
## OFFENSE COMMITTED

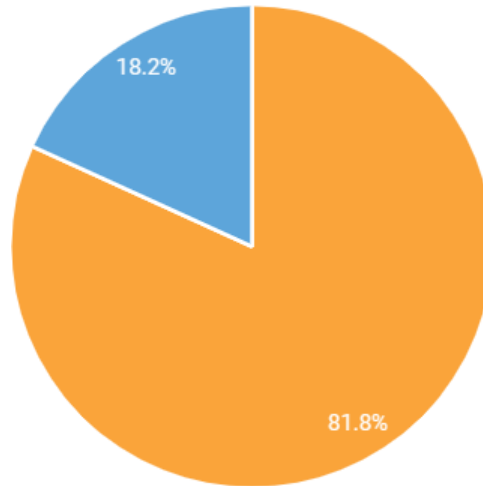

### SUBJECT GENDER

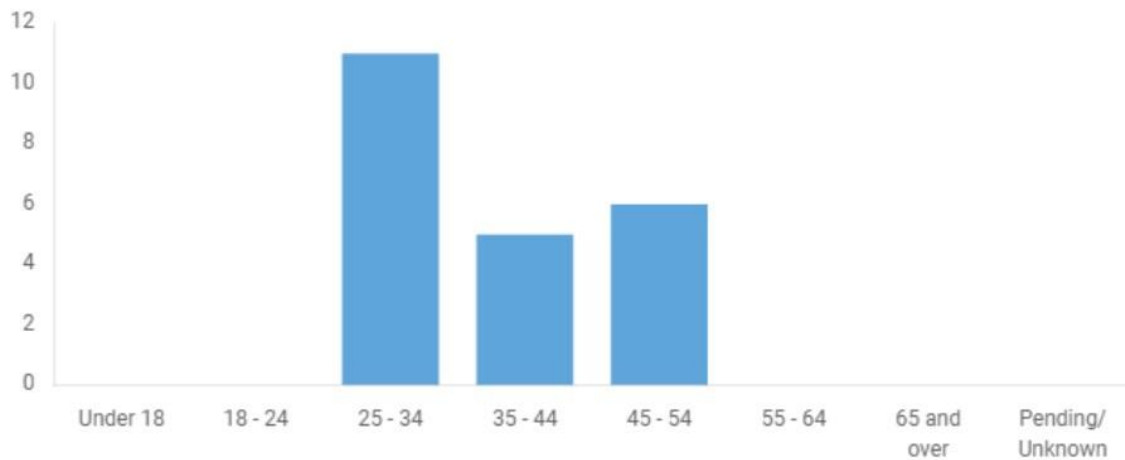

Use of Force

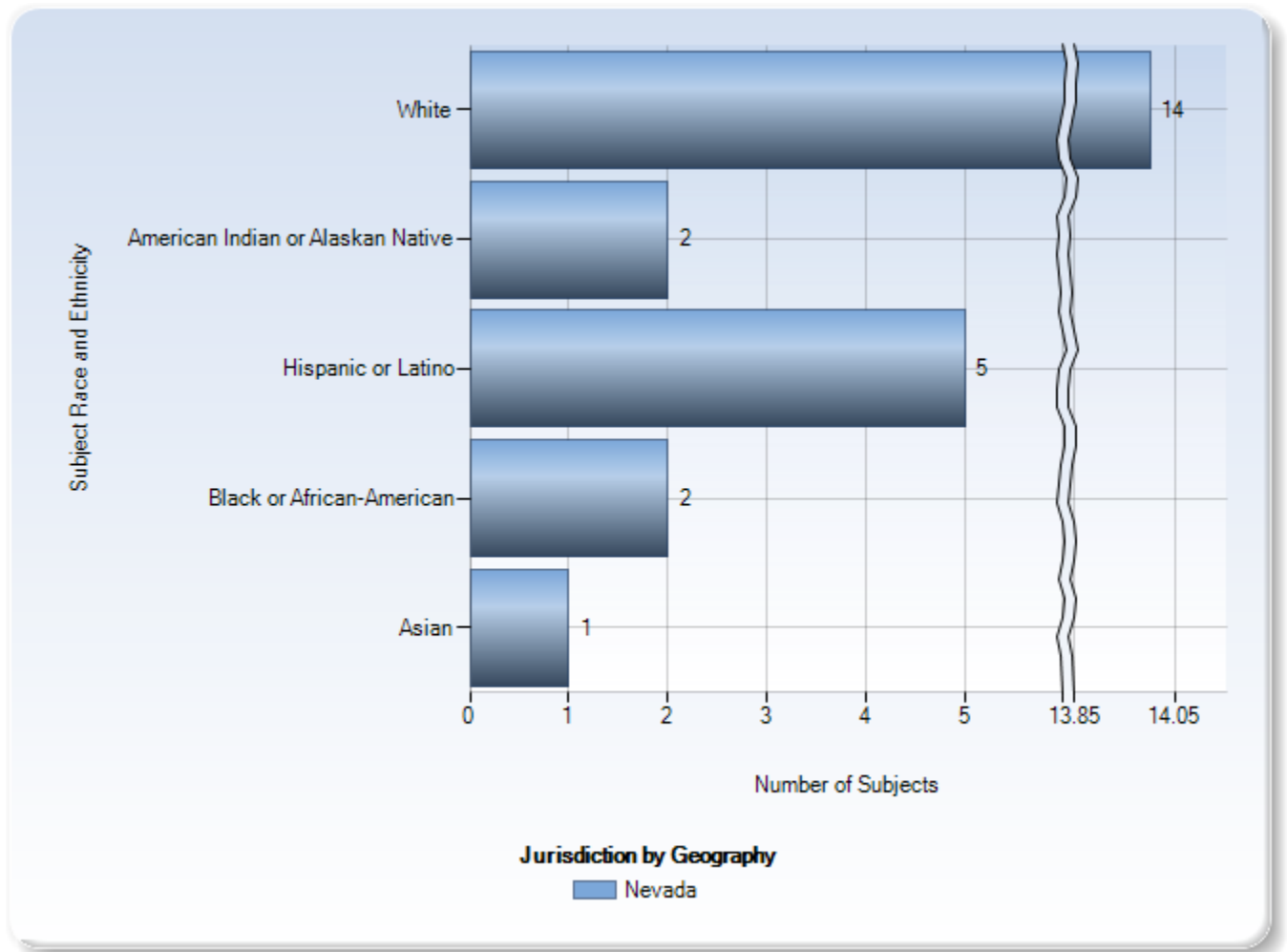

## SUBJECT RACE AND ETHNICITY<sup>6</sup>

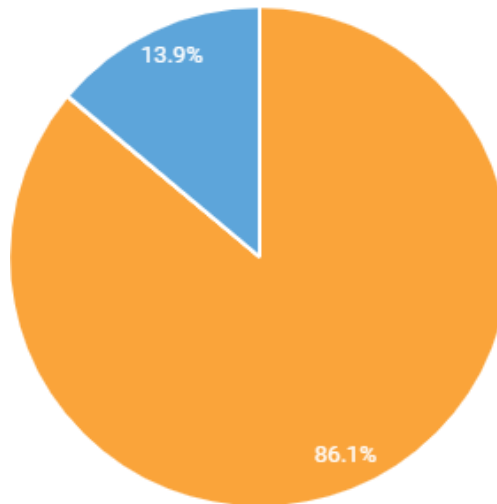

## PEACE OFFICER DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION<sup>7</sup>

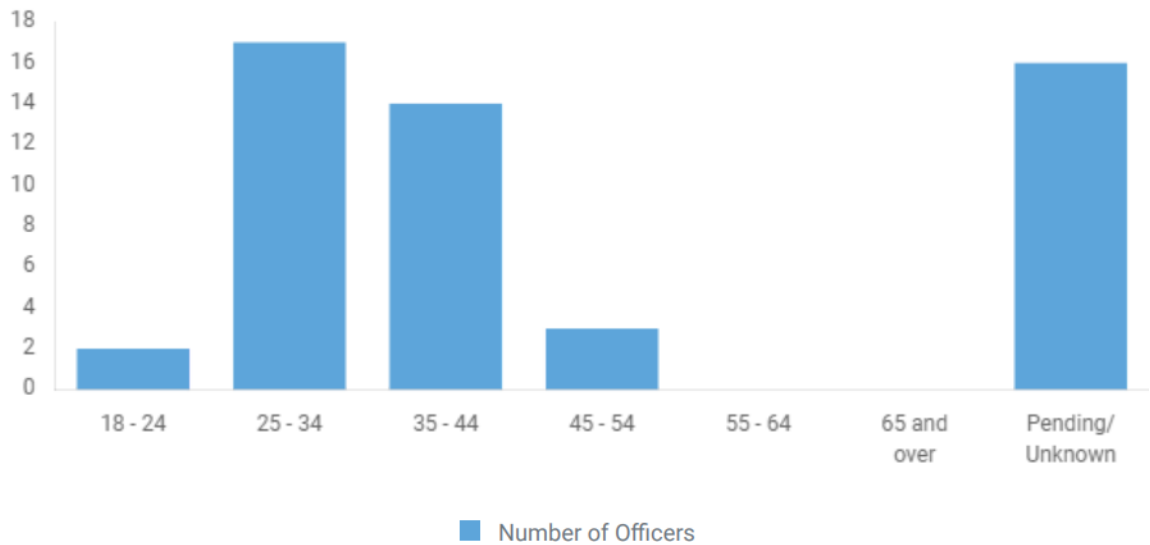
### OFFICER GENDER

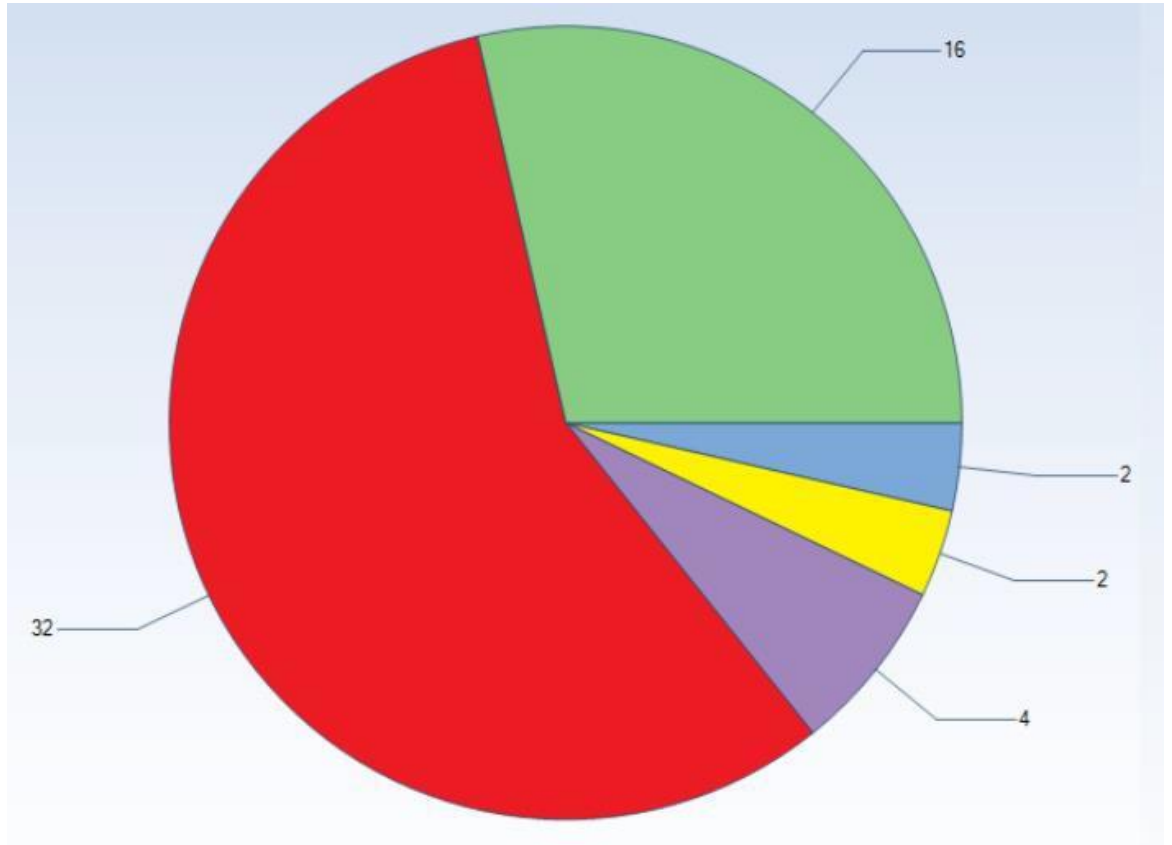


### OFFICER AGE

<sup>7</sup> In order to promote timely reporting, the FBI provides for the “pending/unknown” category as an acceptable answer while a case is still under investigations. Therefore, agencies submit the fact of an incident relatively quickly after its occurrences, even though an investigation is ongoing and “pending.” When the investigation is complete, agencies then update the Repository as they determine all the facts of the incident. This enables the FBI to obtain as close to real time data as possible, rather than waiting the months or sometimes years to officially complete an incident investigation.



<sup>8</sup> If a specific race or ethnicity is not listed or represented in the chart, then no person of that race or ethnicity was identified as having been involved in the reportable use of force incident.
