

2015 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE DATA

The Domestic Violence data presented here is collected per the requirements set forth in Nevada Revised Statute 171.1227.

NRS 171.1227 Peace officer to submit written report concerning suspected acts of domestic violence; information from reports to be aggregated and forwarded to Central Repository; content of report.

- 1. If a peace officer investigates an act that constitutes domestic violence pursuant to NRS 33.018, the peace officer shall prepare and submit a written report of the investigation to the peace officer's supervisor or to another person designated by the peace officer's supervisor, regardless of whether the peace officer makes an arrest.
- If the peace officer investigates a mutual battery that constitutes domestic violence pursuant to NRS 33.018 and finds
 that one of the persons involved was the primary physical aggressor, the peace officer shall include in the report:
- (a) The name of the person who was the primary physical aggressor; and
- (b) A description of the evidence which supports the peace officer's finding.
- 3. If the peace officer does not make an arrest, the peace officer shall include in the report the reason the peace officer did not do so.
- 4. The information contained in a report made pursuant to subsections 1 and 2 must be:
 - (a) Aggregated each month; and
- (b) Forwarded by each jurisdiction to the Central Repository for Nevada Records of Criminal History not later than the 15th day of the following month.
- 5. The Director of the Department of Public Safety shall prescribe the form on which the information described in subsection 4 must be reported to the Central Repository. In addition to the information required pursuant to subsections 1 and 2, the form must also require the inclusion of the following information from each report:
 - (a) The gender, age and race of the persons involved;
 - (b) The relationship of the persons involved;
 - (c) The date and time of day of the offense;
 - (d) The number of children present, if any, at the time of the offense;
 - (e) Whether or not an order for protection against domestic violence was in effect at the time of the offense;
 - (f) Whether or not any weapons were used during the commission of the offense;
 - (g) Whether or not any person required medical attention;
- (h) Whether or not any person was given a domestic violence card that contains information about appropriate counseling or other supportive services available in the community in which that person resides;
- (i) Whether or not the primary physical aggressor, if identified, was arrested and, if not, any mitigating circumstances explaining why an arrest was not made; and
 - (j) Whether or not any other person was arrested.

(Added to NRS by 1997, 1533; A 2007, 2482)

Please note that the collection of Race and Ethnicity data for incidents of Domestic Violence is a relatively new addition. Nevada law enforcement agencies have begun to collect this expanded data; however, it is still incomplete. Therefore, the total number of offenders or victims will not necessarily match the total number of races or ethnicities reported. Possible ethnicities are either Hispanic or Non-Hispanic. For the majority of people of Hispanic Ethnicity their Race is White.





2015 PROTECTION ORDER DATA

The reporting of the protection order data presented here is collected per the guidelines set forth in Nevada Revised Statute 179A.350.

NRS 179A.350 Creation; contents; prompt entry of information; accessibility; submission of report to Legislature.

- 1. The Repository for Information Concerning Orders for Protection Against Domestic Violence is hereby created within the Central Repository.
- 2. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4, the Repository for Information Concerning Orders for Protection Against Domestic Violence must contain a complete and systematic record of all temporary and extended orders for protection against domestic violence issued or registered in the State of Nevada, in accordance with regulations adopted by the Director of the Department, including, without limitation, any information received pursuant to NRS 33.095. Information received by the Central Repository pursuant to NRS 33.095 must be entered in the Repository for Information Concerning Orders for Protection Against Domestic Violence not later than 8 hours after it is received by the Central Repository.
- The information in the Repository for Information Concerning Orders for Protection Against Domestic Violence must be accessible by computer at all times to each agency of criminal justice.
- 4. On or before July 1 of each year, the Director of the Department shall submit to the Director of the Legislative Counsel Bureau a written report concerning all temporary and extended orders for protection against domestic violence issued pursuant to NRS 33.020 during the previous calendar year that were transmitted to the Repository for Information Concerning Orders for Protection Against Domestic Violence. The report must include, without limitation, information for each court that issues temporary or extended orders for protection against domestic violence concerning:
- (a) The total number of temporary and extended orders that were granted by the court pursuant to NRS 33,020 during the calendar year to which the report pertains;
 - (b) The number of temporary and extended orders that were granted to women;
 - (c) The number of temporary and extended orders that were granted to men;
 - (d) The number of temporary and extended orders that were vacated or expired;
 - (e) The number of temporary orders that included a grant of temporary custody of a minor child; and
 - (f) The number of temporary and extended orders that were served on the adverse party.
- 5. The information provided pursuant to subsection 4 must include only aggregate information for statistical purposes and must exclude any identifying information relating to a particular person.
- 6. The Repository for Information Concerning Orders for Protection Against Domestic Violence must not contain any information concerning an event that occurred before October 1, 1998.

(Added to NRS by 1997, 1803; A 2007, 2483)

Definitions

The following report will describe and summarize temporary and extended protection orders issued in the State of Nevada.

These reports are broken down to show which orders were granted to men and to women. Also included is a listing of those orders that included custody of a minor child and available historic data.

The information contained in this report was gathered using a different methodology than in previous years. Previously the data presented was an aggregate of all protection orders issued including all modifications they may have undergone. However, the new methodology aggregates the total number of Temporary Protection Orders and Extended Protection Orders issued per person. This results in a much lower figure than reported in previous years. For reference, the new methodology has been used to supply historical data from 2010 through 2013 for comparison.

Definitions:

Temporary Protection Orders:

Can be granted within 24 hours of receiving the application and in effect up to 30 days or until scheduled court hearing.

Extended Protection Orders:

Awarded only after a hearing before a judge and in effect for up to one year.

Expired Order:

A Temporary Protection Order or Extended Protection Order that has reached the expiration date and was not extended further.

Vacated Order:

A Temporary Protection Order or Extended Protection Order that was cancelled or dissolved prior to the expiration date.


Any of the above orders can also include a grant of temporary custody of a minor child.

Note that on the graphs you will see gender described as male, female, and unknown. Unknown includes those who entered unknown on the application, or those that did not complete the gender portion of the application.

In Nevada, only Protection Orders granted due to Domestic Violence or Domestic Battery are entered into the state Criminal Justice Information System; therefore, these reports do not include any Protection Orders issued for any other reason (i.e. Stalking, Harassment, etc.).


2015 Total Protection Orders Issued By Gender



Temporary Protection Orders Issued Between 1/1/15 and 12/31/15


Extended Temporary Protection Orders Issued Between 1/1/15 and 12/31/15








2015 Protection Orders Issued That Include a Grant of Temporary Custody of a Minor Child


2015 Comparison of Protection Orders Issued and Orders Issued With a Grant of Temporary Custody of a Minor Child





2015 RAPE

Crime Clock - One Rape Every 5 Hours, 11 Minutes

NOTE: In 2011, the FBI UCR Program revised the definition of rape for reporting purposes. As the offense is now defined, it is possible to report either males or females as rape victims.

Rape - penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, or by a sex-related object, without the consent of the victim. This definition includes either gender of victim or offender. This definition also includes instances in which the victim is incapable of giving consent because of temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (including due to the influence of drugs or alcohol) or because of age. Physical resistance is not required on the part of the victim to demonstrate lack of consent.

In 2015 Nevada law enforcement was able to clear 18.09% of rapes.




2015 Rape Offenses by Quarter and Quarterly Average
