Assembly Bill 37 82nd (2023) Legislative Session

- AB 37: "Authorizes the establishment of the Behavioral Health Workforce Development Center of Nevada...under the Nevada System of Higher Education"
- Sponsored by the Rural Regional Behavioral Health Policy Board
- Build out a robust pipeline for behavioral health providers in Nevada
- Initial fiscal allocation has ended; now in UNLV budget



Priorities of AB 37



Higher # of high school students pursuing behavioral health degrees in higher education



Higher # of graduates from NSHE who intern and practice in Nevada



Higher # of BH providers with specialty training to address most critical shortages (i.e. rural areas)



Higher # of supervisors and sites for students and post-grads



Lower amount of time between graduation and registration/licensure










Dr. Alison Netski, Interim Dean of the Kirk Kerkorian School of Medicine at UNLV, attended and interacted with our campers.







Participants showed a significant increase in their familiarity with specific behavioral health careers after attending camp (p = .002), with a large effect size (r = .758), indicating that the camp was highly effective in expanding students' career awareness.



Participants reported a significant increase in their familiarity with behavioral health careers and related education requirements after attending camp (p = .003), with a large effect size (r = .752), demonstrating that the camp effectively enhanced students' understanding of these career pathways.



Expanding Nevada's Clinical Supervision Workforce: CBHC & BeHERE-NV Make Strides

The Community Behavioral Health Collaborative (CBHC), based at the University of Nevada, Reno, partnered with BeHERE-NV to launch a successful clinical supervision training initiative this spring. Sixteen licensed counselors from across the state completed CAS 783: *Supervision for Counseling Professionals* at UNR, positioning them to become state-approved supervisors for CPC, MFT, and LCADC interns.


This exciting milestone could soon add 16 new clinical supervisors to Nevada's behavioral health workforce—opening the door to more internship placements, stronger supervision access, and expanded career pathways for emerging counselors. With participants from both urban and rural communities, the program supports a truly statewide impact.

Led by Drs. Megan Weller and Jennifer Ross, the course included a practicum, mentorship, and CEUs in ethics and cultural competence. The course returns in fall 2025 in an accessible online format.

The Bridge at Washoe County Sheriff's Office

- We envision a community where every individual, no matter their past, has the opportunity for successful reentry after incarceration.
 - Jail-based, pre-release reentry program
 - Provides the structure, tools, and support for change
 - What is successful reentry?
 - Reduce recidivism and increase long-term stability

The Challenge We Faced

- Funding structure
- Lack of institutional knowledge
- Outdated processes: "The way we've always done it..."
- Programming was often ineffective and misaligned
- No tools to measure outcomes or improvement

Commitment to Change

- Launched June-July 2024 with full agency support:
 - Department-wide transformation
 - Evidence-based, data-driven, holistic
- Does your program reduce recidivism?


Recidivism

- Dr. Snider & Ms. Rahr-Wood
 - Uniformity
 - Guide policy
 - Guide research
 - True measurements of impact

As a Measure of Program Performance?


- Measures failure
- Binary
- Observed behavior
- Reflects layered interactions, "between individuals and corrections professionals' training, orientation and skill set" (Pettus-Davis Kennedy, 2020: 373)

3/15/2022 - 3/14/2025 3 Year Post-Program



The date for each recidivist event should be based on the underlying offense date, if possible, as they are each ways of measuring reoffending. The individual events (arrest, charge, conviction, incarceration) may occur at points in time after the offense date and may even be outside of the follow-up period used to measure the cohort, even if the offense date is within the follow-up period. For example, the conviction and incarceration dates for the Possession offense occur after the end of the 3-year post recidivism cut-off date, but the offense date was within the follow-up period so these would be counted as recidivist events.

What is Desistance?

- Primary
 - Criminal behavior
- Secondary
 - Shift in identity

How Does Your Program Define Successful Reentry?

How are you going to measure that?

It isn't meaningful if it's not measurable

Scientific Method

- Theory of change working hypothesis
- Logic model test the hypothesis
 - Link program's goals, resources, and activities to:
 - Intended outcomes, which:
 - Depicts functionality

Recommendation

- Alongside state-mandated recidivism measures, require that all publicly funded or publicly administered reentry programs:
 - Define success using clear, behavior-based outcomes
 - Programs must articulate what meaningful behavior change looks like for participants

Recommendation

- Employ standardized methods for tracking and measuring progress
 - Include tools for measuring engagement, goal attainment, and behavioral milestones

Recommendation


- Implement consistent reporting requirements
 - Ensure outcomes are reported to government partners in a way that supports data-driven decision-making and accountability

6. DISCUSS AND DRAFT PROPOSED 2025 RESPONSE SUBCOMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation #1

Submitted by: Dr. Shayla Holmes

Description: Prohibit the sale of all psychoactive substances, including hemp-derived cannabinoids and psychoactive mushrooms, to individuals under 21 years of age, aligning with existing cannabis regulations.

Implement Clear Labeling Standards: Mandate that all products containing psychoactive compounds have standardized labeling, including clear warnings about potential health risks and age restrictions.

Restrict Sales Locations: Limit the sale of these substances to licensed establishments that can verify the age of purchasers and prohibit sales near schools and other youth-centered facilities.

Enhance Enforcement Mechanisms: Provide regulatory agencies with authority and resources to monitor compliance, conduct inspections, and enforce penalties for violations.

Recommendation #1 (cont.)

Justification: In Nevada, it is illegal for individuals under 21 to purchase or possess cannabis products, including Delta-9 THC, unless they are medical marijuana cardholders. Additionally, over-the-counter (OTC) medications containing dextromethorphan (DXM) cannot be sold to minors under 18 without a prescription.

However, certain substances, such as hemp-derived Delta-9 THC products (containing less than 0.3% THC by dry weight) and psychoactive mushrooms, may be legally accessible due to their specific chemical compositions and lack of comprehensive regulation. This creates potential loopholes that could allow minors to obtain and misuse these substances.

Action Step: Bill Draft Request (BDR), Regulatory or Licensing Board

Recommendation #2

Submitted by: Dr. Terry Kerns

Description: Revise this recommendation to also include desistance: Recommend state agencies under the legislative, judicial, and executive branches involved with deflection and diversion programs have a comprehensive definition of recidivism, and policies related to measuring and reporting recidivism.

Justification: Desistance is potentially a more accurate way to measure program impact.

Action Step: State agencies that support diversion and deflection programs have a definition of recidivism. Also have a working group to address this.

Potential revision: Recommend state agencies under the legislative, judicial, and executive branches involved with deflection and diversion programs have a comprehensive definition of recidivism and desistance, and standardized policies related to measuring and reporting recidivism. Additionally, require that all publicly funded or publicly administered reentry programs define success using clear, behavior-based outcomes and that programs articulate what meaningful behavior change looks like for participants using tools for measuring engagement, goal attainment, and behavioral milestones.
